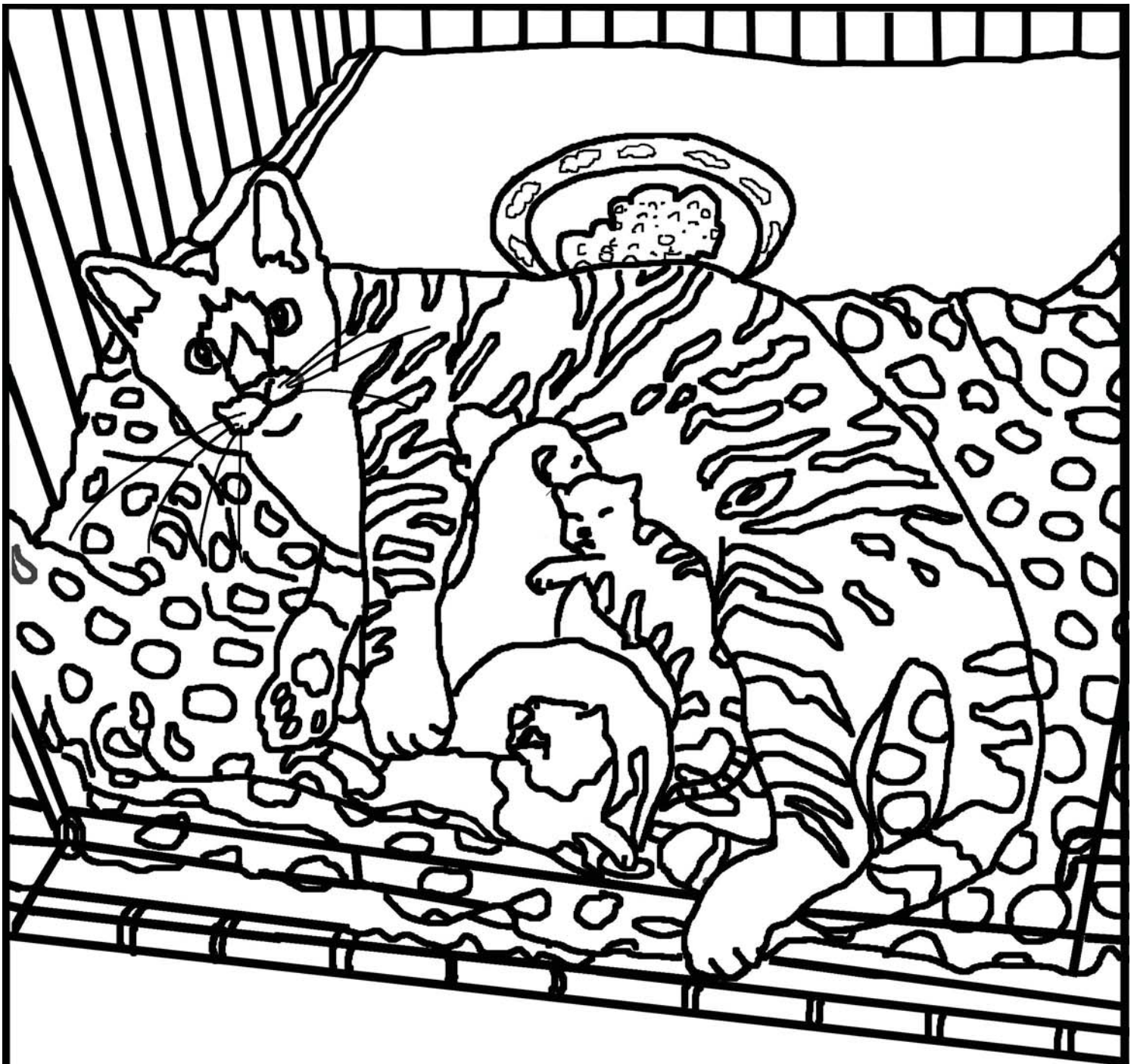




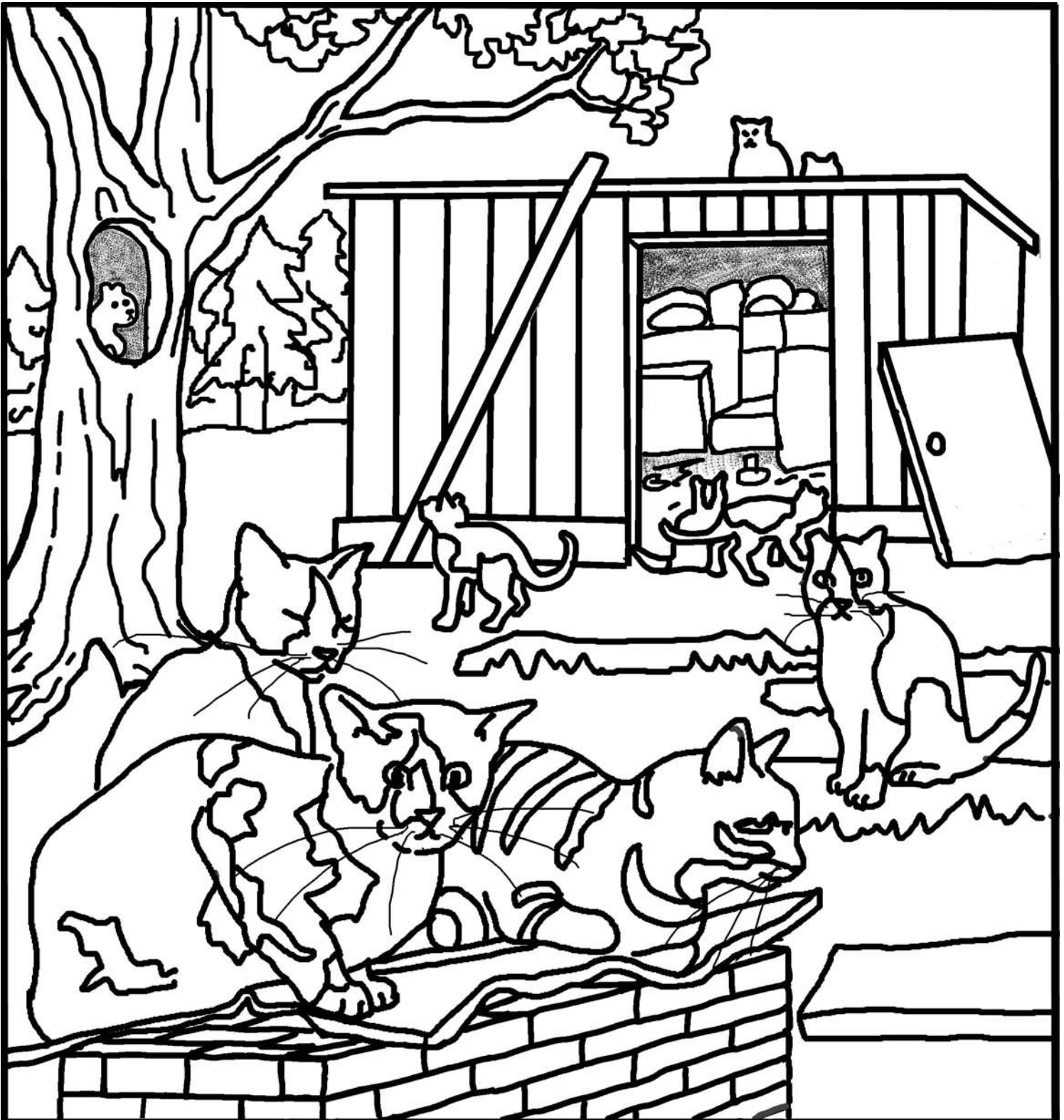
Those of us that live outside have many names - community cats, street cats, feral cats and others.



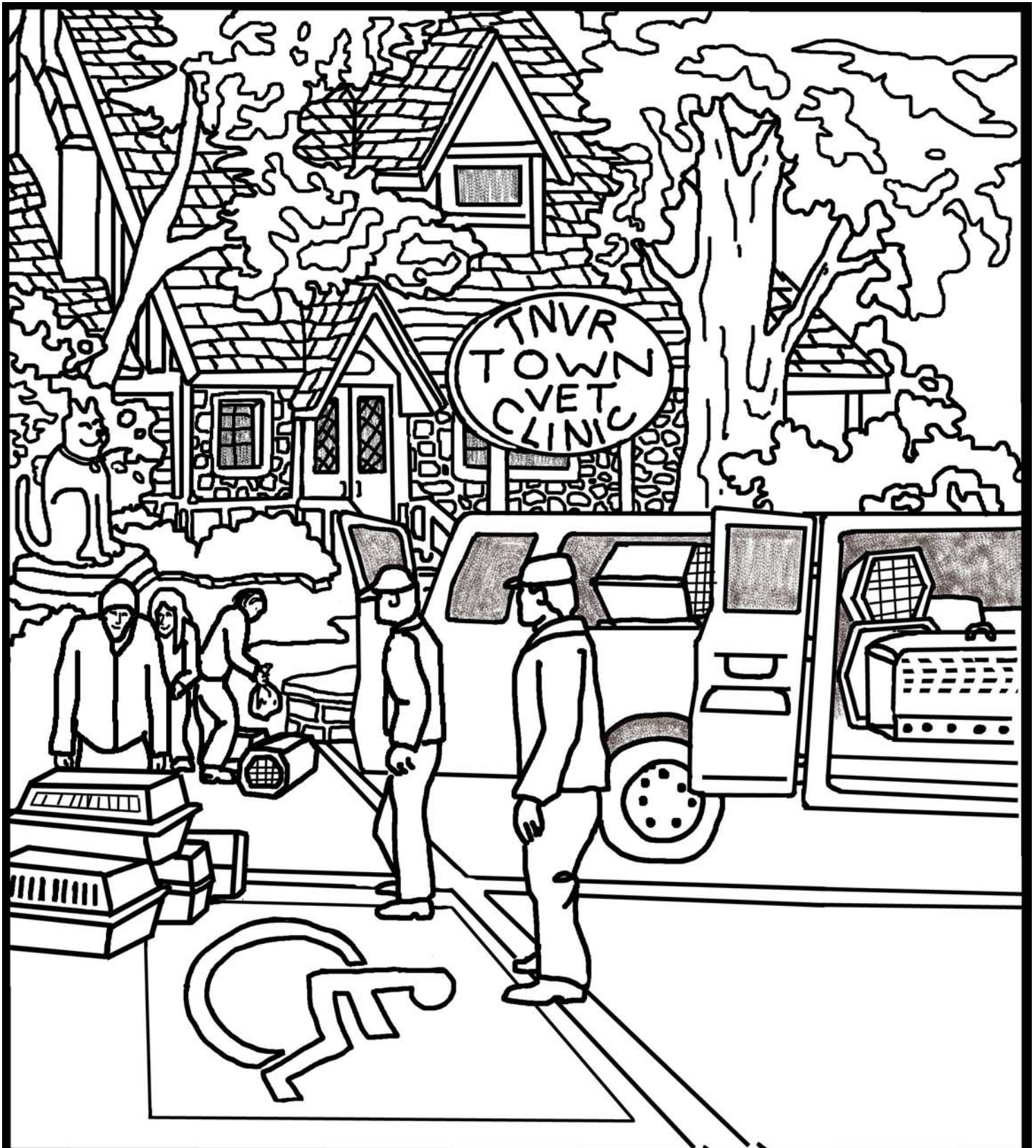
**As a community cat, we have no owners.

The better way is called Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR). This involves humanely trapping us, having us spayed or neutered, and then after recovery, returning us to our outside home.



Once we are trapped, we are transported to a licensed veterinarian who will perform spay or neuter surgery.

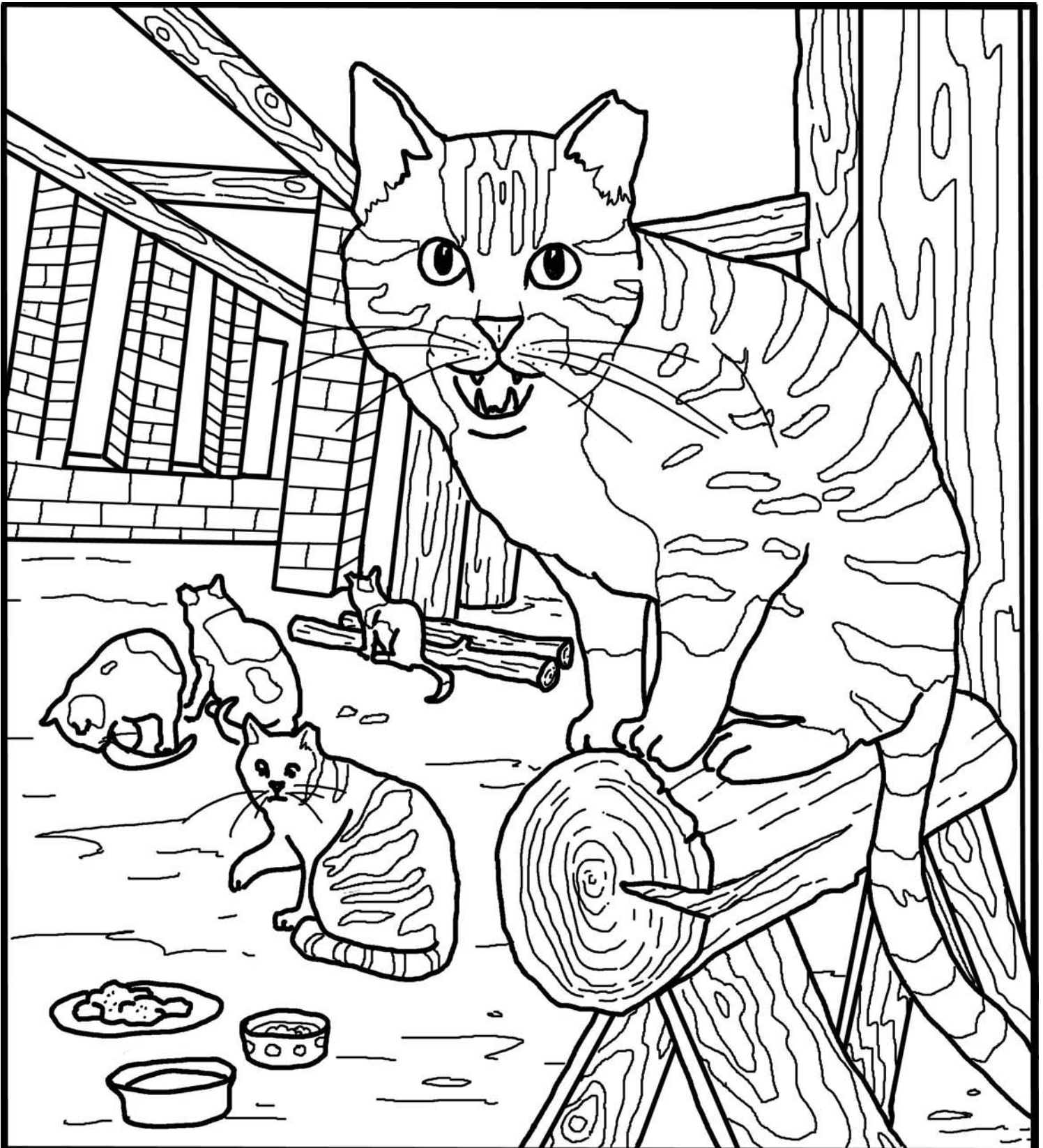


Then surgery begins and we are on our way to a new life

to show we have been fixed.

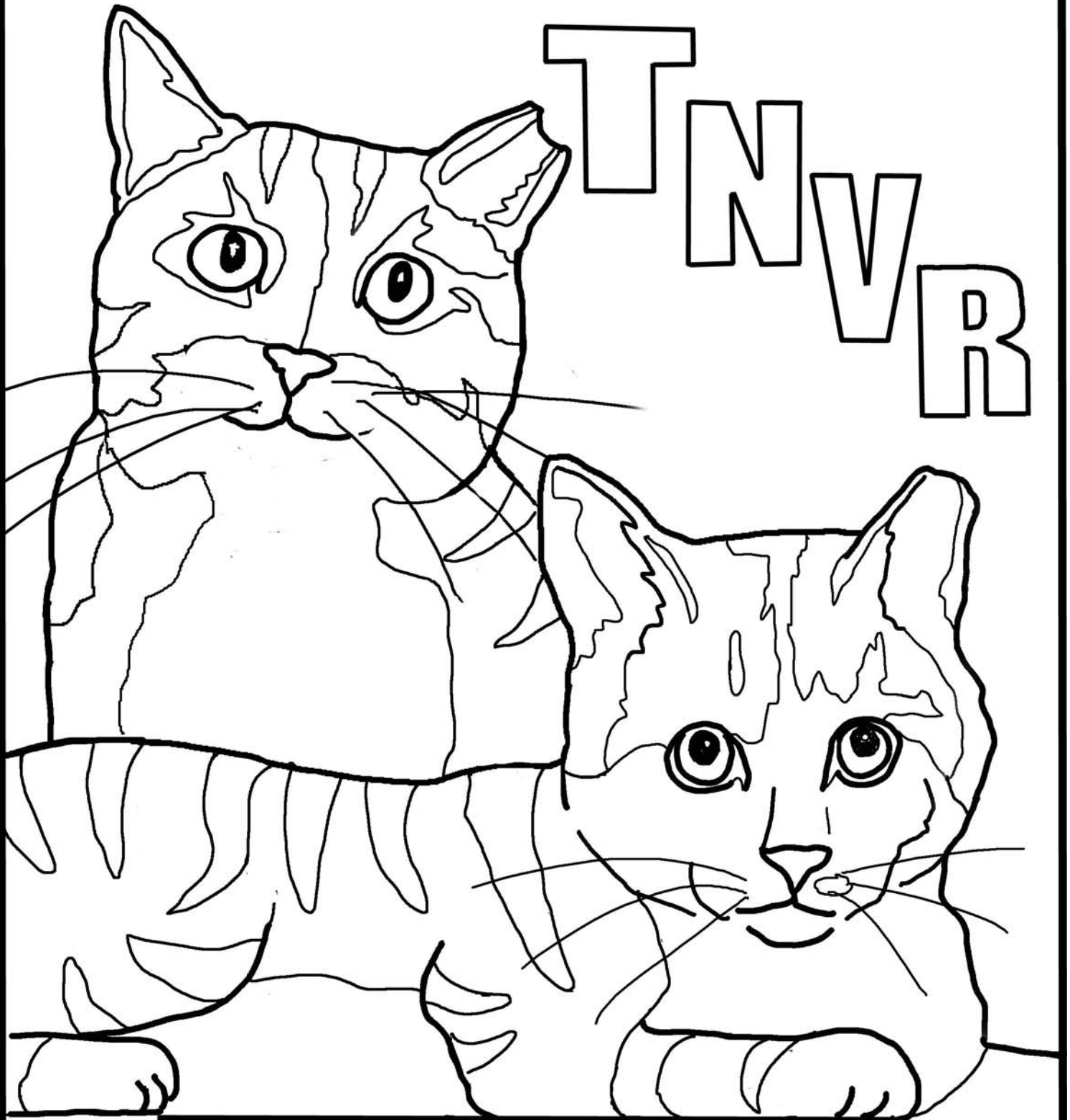
After all, it's Hip to be Tipped!
